HOPE. A WORD FOR THE NEW YEAR

HOPE. This is my 'word for the year' for 2024. I have chosen it as a single word to motivate and encourage me to focus on what is important in this season of my life as I live among you, work with you and seek to serve you with joy.

I generally do choose a word for the year, but I have not made it public before now. So what has changed?

Not so long ago, I was asked to give a short talk in Dalwood and I referred to myself as a "dealer" – I hasten to add, I am not a wheeler dealer, a car dealer, an antiques dealer, and neither am I a drug dealer. I am a dealer in faith, hope and love which St Paul describes in his letter to the Corinthians as the things that remain when all else has disappeared – you can read his words in 1 Corinthians 13 v 13: "And now faith, hope and love abide, these three, and the greatest of these is love."

Of these three words, 'hope' is the one that has leapt off the page at me, and so for the next 12 months, I am going to keep it in a prominent position around the house, in the car, by my toothbrush and every time I see it I will reminded that hope is a verb – a doing word, active and yet grounded at the same time.

And the reason for my hope? None other than the person of Jesus whose birth we have just celebrated. When I think about it, that is true if I had chosen faith or love as well, but for some reason it is hope that I will carry with me for the next 366 days (as it's a leap year!). I wonder what your word is going to be?

RIVERS RUN THROUGH US

Connecting people and nature to restore the River Axe

The River Axe was, until the latter half of the 1900s, one of the best surviving lowland rivers in England. But, over the last 40 years, it has declined and is now classified by Natural England as being in Unfavourable Condition for wildlife, and declining yet further as each year passes.

Pollution from agriculture, homes and businesses is at the root of the river's problems, made worse by climate change. Many agencies are working together to tackle these problems and restore the river, but improvements are slow and we need to accelerate the pace of change.

Rivers Run Through Us (RRTU) is a project that's being developed by the three Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONBs) that include the waters that feed the River Axe: the Blackdown Hills, Dorset and East Devon. RRTU aims to harness the power of people working together in communities to support the changes needed. This could include:

Huge audience for young Ezra

I DOUBT if many of the audience of between 50 and 60 have often – if ever – seen such talent in one so young.

We were treated to excellent performances in November on both the piano, but more amazingly, the church organ by Ezra Jefferies, pictured, who is 12 years old.

Ezra is, as yet, of smaller stature and it was a revelation to see him manage all the foot and swell pedals as well as reaching all the stops on the organ.

The young musician played three pieces on the organ starting with Edward Greig's Norwegian Dance Number 2, which he played with excellent tone and feeling. This was followed by a piece by Petra Eben – Choral Partita Variation Number 3 and finishing with Bach's Toccata in D minor. All these pieces were played with confidence, exuberance and precision and earned extended and justly deserved applause from the audience. The organ certainly benefitted from such a good workout.

Moving to the piano, Ezra was joined by another musician and they played two duets, a waltz and a slow foxtrot by Gerard Hengedveld delivered with enthusiasm and their obvious enjoyment.

Ezra, on his own, then gave an insight into his own taste in music by playing several jazz pieces, including the tongue twister Willie Wagglesticks Walkabout which required some very rapid fingering and a great deal of concentration. Other jazz pieces included Steam Train Blues, Spring Song and In a Hurry from the microjazz series by Christopher Norton. Ezra finished his recital with I dreamed a Dream from Les Miserables. Another extended round of applause greeted Ezra which he accepted with a bow, a smile and a wave.

He was then in for a bit of a shock as he was subjected to an interview without warning. However, Ezra answered all the questions with confidence and humour. As a result, the audience learned that Ezra has been playing the piano from the age of seven and the church organ since eight-and-a-half. He has played in Salisbury Cathedral, Wimborne Minster and St Swithin's in Bridport. This is possible through the Pipe Up scheme which encourages youngsters to study church organ playing.

Dalwood Coffee Concert goers were amazed at the talent and skill shown and were very privileged to be entertained by this young man and look forward to a return performance. Ezra would no doubt be pleased to know that he attracted the biggest audience for a coffee concert this year and that over £300 was raised for charity ShelterBox.

Turbaries talk is exceptional evening

AN exceptional evening in November was supported by an exceptional turnout of local people. From their medieval history to the work of volunteers today, the story of the parishes' historical unique and wild areas, Stockland turbaries, unfolded throughout the evening's lecture delivered by the local experts David Allan and Peter Derryman.

The preservation of these areas – Bucehayes, Quantock, Shore Bottom and Featherlake – has been diligently pursued by them, alongside Geoff Pearce and a series of enthusiastic volunteers. Without such, many of the species and habitats would have, without a doubt, died out. The early years of saving and restoring the areas were related through filming showing the clearing of scrub and debris and invasive growth. The audience could easily recognise the youthful persona of the evening's story tellers with a very young Andy Podbury at the helm of the digger carrying out pond construction and clearance. The film was completely absorbing as was the dialogue outlining the return and increase of species and use of habitats.

The question-and-answer session that followed was clearly welcomed by the audience which was absorbed by the accounts of the early days' trials and tribulations and now the necessary future commitments to the four areas.

However, restoration and preservation are ongoing, relentless tasks with the desperate need for more volunteers. The evening's lecture promoted much interest and the momentum gained suggested that there will be many more help to aid with the enormous task of preserving the turbary heritage.

ANNABEL'S TESTIMONY IS SHARED

ANNABEL Kent, pictured, wrote this testimony after she had been diagnosed with terminal cancer. She was 48. Known to many in and around Yarcombe for the Pilates classes she ran in the village hall and elsewhere, she was a picture of health and fitness to which others could only aspire with envy.

Becoming a born-again Christian brought peace and contentment even when she was nearing the end of her life...

Trust in the Lord with all your heart; and lean not on your own understanding. In all your ways acknowledge Him, and He shall direct your paths. (Proverbs 3: 5-6).

If you had asked me before I became a Christian what my biggest regret in life was, I might have said any number of things. But now I can say, with hesitation, that my biggest regret is, that I did not know Christ as my Lord and Saviour, as I know Him now. I did not enjoy a personal and intimate relationship with Him by faith, and by the grace of God. I spent far too many years without the Lord Jesus Christ as my guide and counsellor.

There came a glorious day in my life when I passed from spiritual death to spiritual life. *He put a new song in my mouth (Psalm 40:3).* And when you pass from death to life, the truth hits you that for so many years, I had been ignorant of His wonderful love and mercy.

It was such a relief, finally, to repent of all my wrongdoings, and to feel the guilt and burden of them lifted from me: for Jesus himself had taken them upon the cross on my behalf. I knew Christ was in that room with me; and the outpouring of His love in that moment was of a love like one that I had never experienced before.

God commends His love toward us in that while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us. (Romans 5:8)



I realised also that I had not been seeking so much for happiness – because a sense, even of genuine human happiness, can often be found in the short term; but rather, I had been seeking for peace – a deep, inward and lasting peace that only Christ Jesus can give us.

That peace, once received, no person or circumstance of life (including facing a seemingly premature death), can ever take away. Such a peace is from God Himself, and surpasses all understanding.

"Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you; not as the world gives do I give to you. Let not your heart be troubled, neither let it be afraid." (John 14:27)

Once you have truly met with the Lord, you never want to go back to the

things of this world.

The Kingdom of Heaven is like a treasure hidden in a field which a man found and hid, and for joy over it he goes and sells all that he has and buys that field. (Matthew 13:44)

I have no fear of death. Death has lost its sting (I Corinthians 15:55).

I know that the Lord's sacrifice for me on the cross has paid the price for my eternal soul, and that, by entirely trusting in Him, He has secured a place for me in heaven.

The only way is through Christ, not by works, it is a free gift from God.

I am the way, the truth and the life. No one comes to the Father except through Me. (John 14:6)

What must one do to be saved and gain that blessed assurance? It is really very simple. God promises that in the day and hour we search for Him with all of our heart, we shall surely find Him.

A person may know very little of the things of God, and may never have attended a church on a regular basis. But if that person knows their profound need of God, of His forgiveness and cleansing, then He invites them to come to Him, just as they are, with the unquestioning faith of a child, and to call upon His name.

Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. (Romans 10:13)

I am the resurrection and the life. He who believes in Me, though he may die, he shall live. (John 11:25)
