Large audiences were privileged to hear illuminating and powerful talks from a number of leading authors, spanning subjects from spies and war crimes, murder and forensic science, to scented gardens, life in the old West Country, and poetry.

The festival also saw the UK premier of the documentary, Free Men, about the life of death row artist Kenny Reams. Mr Reams called from his nine-by-four-foot cell in Arkansas to join in a question-and-answer session after the screening.

Festivalgoers also enjoyed a landscape walk organised by Legacy to Landscape, delicious home-cooked food from Khushi Kitchen and Harriet Haines, and also cakes and teas prepared by the Friends of Shute Church. Children were entertained by a varied programme of activities, including film-making, ceramics and pottery making, bush-crafts and land art.

SHUTE NEWS Colourful discoveries on Shute history are shared

ON August 29th, local writer and historian Bijan Omrani presented a talk at Shute church on New Discoveries in the History of Shute.

Bijan has been working for over a year on a research project to discover more about the 19th and early 20th centuries' history of Shute House, the Pole family who lived there, and the wider village and Shute estate. The research has been conducted at a wide variety of archives and libraries including the county record offices in Exeter, Plymouth and Taunton, the British Library, the National Archives at Kew, and even at archives in New York and Paris. A key source was also the archives held at Antony House in Cornwall, the current seat of the Pole Baronets.

Speaking to a capacity audience at St Michael's Church of around 130, Bijan was able to reveal a number of remarkable discoveries about the life of the Shute Estate during this period. A number of these were about Sir John de la Pole, who is famous locally for the 1829 coming-of-age 'Ox Roast', but about whom little has otherwise been known.

These discoveries included schoolboy letters about Sir John's eccentric character, his lost poetry in Byronic style, and his high-level literary and artistic connections in London and on the continent. Dramatic incidents included the attempted suicide of his second, French wife at Shute, who threw herself out of a third-floor window in 1849 - but survived over another 50 vears, the birth of his two natural children with a French actress in the 1850s, a duel fought over his daughter after she eloped with an army officer to Piedmont, and bitter feuds within the family over the wealth of the estate.

Bijan was able to present the lost writings of the 9th Shute Baronet, Sir William. These were

rediscovered in the Library of Yale University in the US. Sir William wrote many works on what he believed were the connections between the Biblical Phoenicians, Devon and South America. These writings included a love story entitled Prester John and Humming Bird, and were written at Shute.

Bijan also revealed that the 10th Shute Baronet, Sir Edmund, lived as a poor Bohemian writer, on bad terms with the family, before inheriting the Shute estate in 1895. Edmund wrote a number of novels and short stories, many of which were published anonymously in the 1870s and 1880s, and which focused on the subject of emancipated women. Bijan revealed that Edmund shared friendships with a number of famous Victorian women, including the novelist Charlotte Riddell and the popular soprano and women's rights activist Georgina Weldon. He also revealed that Edmund shared a friendship with the French opera composer and Charles Gounod, who was Georgina Weldon's lover, and that when the relationship between Gounod and Weldon broke down, Edmund acted as a go-between, visiting Gounod in Paris in 1874 to deal with the fall-out from their estrangement.

Bijan also argued that Edmund was inspired to build the Shute House theatre in the 1890s by the lost house theatre of Charles Dickens in Tavistock House, London, which in the 1870s was the London house of Mrs Weldon.

The research also found a great deal of other colourful material, including the fact that Shute House used to possess a cannon that was fired on special occasions, and that Sir William started to build a stone tower at the East end of the drive in 1887 that appears not to have been completed. Bijan was also able to present a number of photographs and drawings from original archive sources.

The research is ongoing, and there will be further updates in due course as new discoveries are made.

There will be a whole host of activities for young and old alike, including apple pressing, displays of different apple varieties - including Shute's own cider apple, the Crimson Victoria - and kids' apple games.

The apple day is a must for lovers of local history. It will take place in the historic surroundings of Rowlands Orchard, which dates back to the 16th Century, and which contains the original walled kitchen gardens of Shute House. It also coincides with the October open weekend at Shute Barton, which will allow visitors to take in both Rowlands Orchard, as well as the Barton. Refreshments will be available in Shute church.

The day will be concluded with a talk about cider by Westcountry author and renowned authority on cider, James Crowden. James is the author of Ciderland, amongst many other books on Devon food and local history. He is also a presenter of BBC travel and food documentaries, many focused on this part of the country. He is a noted speaker and raconteur, and is guaranteed to be an exciting conclusion to the day.

The talk will take place at 4.30pm in the church.

New seasonal feature by Philippa Wilks: Apple & Cinnamon Scones

APPLE DAYS KEEP DOCTOR AWAY

AUTUMN is apple season, as a walk around the five parishes will show you. Take care - an apple a day may keep the doctor away, but some say if you fall asleep in an orchard, you may wake up years later!

There are thousands of apple varieties: we all know the Cox's Orange Pippin, the Bramley, the Braeburn; but what about the Core Blimey, the Honey Crisp, the 10 Commandments, the D'Arcy Spice and the Pig's Nose Pippin? There's even one that tastes like a banana.

National Apple Day falls on October 21st and we have our own celebration locally in Yarcombe on this date.

Here's a recipe for apple and cinnamon scones to tempt your tastebuds...

Ingredients:

500g self-raising flour 140g butter, cubed 90g caster sugar 1 large apple, peeled and diced 2tsp ground cinnamon 1 egg, beaten Approx. 200ml milk

Method:

Preheat oven to 210 C. Grease a baking sheet. 1) Sift the flour into a mixing bowl, rub in the butter. Stir in the sugar, the cinnamon and the apple.



2) Add the beaten egg and enough milk to make a soft dough.

3) Lightly flour a work surface, knead the dough briefly, roll out to about 3cm thick. Cut out with a 7cm cutter.

4) Place on the baking sheet, brush the tops with a little milk. Bake for 10 -12 minutes till risen and golden.
