

Bible is best seller ever

BIBLE Sunday was celebrated in St Giles's Church on October 27th at a Family Service, led by Brian Lavender.

In his welcome, he pointed out that it was evident from the scriptures that Jesus was an avid reader of the Old Testament from a very young age and that it was fortunate that his disciples had recorded so many of his teachings and the events which led to his crucifixion and resurrection.

The lessons were read by Gill Gibbs and Jean Falconer, the collect by Marion Richardson, the intercession prayers led by John Martell, while Margaret Hurford and the choir led hymns for the occasion.

In his address, Brian reminded the congregation that The Bible covered a 1500-year span from 1400BC to AD100. It consisted of 1,189 chapters, 929 in the Old Testament and 260 in the New Testament. There were 40 authors from all walks of life - kings, peasants, philosophers,

fishermen, poets, statesmen and scholars. The languages used were Hebrew, Aramaic and Greek. Total sales are estimated to be over five billion, by far the best-selling book of all time.

At present, annual sales are over 100million copies, quite amazing more than 2,000 years after the birth of Christ. He pointed out that there are many versions of The Bible in use today, the Anglican Church usually preferring the New Revised Standard Version. However, after comparing a reading from that version of Psalm 119, verses 129 to 136, every single member of the congregation voted in favour of the Good News Bible version for a family service.

An 11lb King James Illustrated Family Bible published by Cassell, Petter and Galpin in the 1870-80s and others were brought to the service and verses from most versions can be downloaded from an iPhone.

Trying a hand at willow work

LAST month the Swag group welcomed Jenny Knight who with her husband runs JK Willows – a firm making a range of willow products to include butterflies, dragonflies, fish, snails and more items many of which were familiar to us from Jenny's appearances at Stockland Fair and other local events.

She explained that there are several varieties of willow and that we would be making a simple star design with one called Black Mole which is picked, dried and soaked to make it pliable and ready for use. Jenny took a length of fine willow, made kinks with her thumbnail along its length, shaped it into a pointed star before binding it to hold the shape and adding filler strips which are woven through the star to strengthen it and give a more three dimensional effect Just how difficult could that be? The expression 'easier said than done' came to mind as with much mirth and great difficulty, we struggled to create something that looked vaguely like a star - Jenny was in great demand as she circulated to help - or should that be 'rescue' our somewhat fallen stars! Fortunately, she had brought along some of her designs including some Christmas items for sale so that we did look very proficient as we carried them home.

Our next meeting will be our Christmas lunch on December 10th – we had hoped to have this at the Kings Arms but unfortunately it will not be open for Christmas so we shall look forward to being there next year and meanwhile return to the Deer Park Hotel.

FOR the week following Remembrance Sunday, St Michael's Church, Shute, played host to a remarkable one-off exhibition of local wartime memorabilia and poppy display.

The exhibition, which was organised under the direction of Ella Sweetland, had been in the planning for over a year, and brought together a number of military artefacts which had been loaned by local residents. These included several uniforms, one of which dated back to the First World War that of a Flight Engineer of the Royal Naval Air Service, worn by Mr A Easton when on active service in Port Said, and loaned by Peter Easton, of Whitford. Also displayed were helmets, gas masks, ration books, and other items from the Second World War.

There were also a number of displays which retold the stories of the contribution made by Shute and the local area to the two world wars and other 20th Century conflicts. In particular, information was provided about the men commemorated on the Shute War Memorial. These included memorabilia and details about the life of Captain Harry Glasper, who won the Military Cross at the Battle of El Alamein in 1942, and later fell during the invasion of Germany in April 1945 at the age of 32. Another display showed photographs and provided accounts of the dramatic shooting down of a German Dornier bomber over Shute on 23 April 1942, along with the capture of the wounded crew members and the subsequent disposal of a 1400kg bomb which had been part of the aircraft's payload.

The appearance of the church was transformed by the display of hundreds of poppies, many of which had been patiently knitted by a team of volunteers over a number of months. Bands of these homemade poppies adorned the church walls, columns, pulpit, railings and choir stalls. The church was also decorated with a large number of flags and wartime posters.

The children of Shute Primary School also benefitted from the exhibition. The whole school, joined by a number of parents, assembled in front of the Shute War Memorial and participated in the 11am silence on Armistice Day. Following this,



they walked to the church and performed a number of short readings and sang songs on the theme of war, peace and remembrance, after which they were given an opportunity to view the exhibition. The children also created large poppies on which they inscribed their thoughts about remembrance which were displayed by the altar, as well as a large banner on the theme, which they placed in the church over the period of the exhibition.

The exhibition was particularly well attended on the Friday and weekend, and attracted many local residents who welcomed the opportunity to exchange stories about the wartime history of the area. The Friends of Shute Church also provided tea and refreshments

whilst the exhibition was open, and were able to do much fundraising to the benefit of the church.

This is the latest in the number of occasional exhibitions at Shute church, and follows on from the history weekend exhibition held there a couple of years ago. It shows the considerable interest of many in the rich local history of the area, and it is to be hoped that similar exhibitions will be held at the church in future years.

Particular thanks are due to Ella Sweetland for organising the exhibition, the many volunteers who helped to make poppies, decorate the church and staff the exhibition, and also Liz Gosling and the Friends of Shute Church for the widely-appreciated tea and refreshments.




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Jan talks to ladies about botanical gardens

After a dry warm summer the countryside needed rain, it started on the 27th September and only stopped on three separate days in October. Here was very little sunshine. We saw glimpse on 17 days.

The fields are now very sodden, so I hope that the rain eases to give the soil a chance to dry out. I recorded our first ground frost on the 28th October.

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


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
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
