MY wife, Jennifer, died on September 1st 2022 in Searle House Hospice. She had suffered long with cancer and I was privileged to have been her carer.

For her funeral, she had requested, Faure' Requiem: in Paradisum, Jerusalem, Gracious Spirit Holy Ghost and John Rutter's Gaelic Blessing.

Words in Paradisum are "may the angels lead you into paradise" and end with "may you have eternal rest".

This country was very close to Jennifer's heart so Jerusalem was a hymn she loved. And the hymn Gracious Spirit, Holy Ghost has love in every verse and to me it is a total memory of Jennifer throughout our life together. To end, she adored John Rutter's music and the Gaelic Blessing.

Jen was an SRN nurse and she trained at Kings' College London where I met her at my brother's wedding in January 1964.

We immediately fell in love and

were married at St Mary's Parish church in Andover in the December of 1964. Her nursing included district nurse, practice nurse, industrial nursing and a lot more, indeed she was nursing up until three years before she died. That is, of course, very briefly a little about Jennifer.

She always cared for people she met in her professional life and even more so for family and friends. We shared 58 years of marriage with lots of love and understanding.

We have two sons, Nicholas and Robin, who each gave us two granddaughters, Jessica, Annie, Ellie and Rosie.

I have chosen this hymn written by Christopher Wordsworth (1807-1885) in loving memory of Jennifer.

1 Gracious Spirit, Holy Ghost, taught by thee, we covet most of thy gifts at Pentecost, holy, heavenly love. 2 Love is kind, and suffers long, love is meek, and thinks no wrong, love than death itself more strong; therefore give us love.

4 Faith will vanish into sight; hope be emptied in delight; love in heaven will shine more bright; therefore give us love.

5 Faith and hope and love we see joining hand in hand agree; but the greatest of the three, and the best, is love.

Archdeacon Andrew Beane led the relaxed service and everyone appreciated the setting, with the view of the fields and surrounding hills.


He provided an entertaining story (with some helpers – a farmer, his wife,

THE church of St Peter belongs to the whole village and reisidents are invited to an open meeting at 4pm on Sunday, November 5th in Dalwood Village Hall.

The Church of England has made a commitment that the whole church becomes eco-friendly and for all buildings and activities to be carbon neutral by 2030 – just seven years away.

A statement from Exeter Diocese said: "The Diocese of Exeter recognises that the global climate emergency is not only a crisis for God's creation but is causing fundamental injustices across the globe.

"With the national Church of England, we commit ourselves to work with all available resources towards net zero carbon by 2030.

"In Dalwood, our only church building is St Peter's Church and we need to reduce our carbon footprint and/or generate the equivalent to our annual usage by green methods, to reach zero carbon."

Trusting that there is a great deal of knowledge, wisdom and experience in Dalwood, residents are asked for their input, ideas and skills on how this might be achieved for their church.

## **FUN-PACKED FAIR DAY**



SATURDAY, August 19th saw crowds flocking to the 677th Dalwood Fair.

The fair has been an important part of village life since 1345, with the right to hold a fair given to William de Chantmerle, tenant of the Royal Manor of Dalwood, by King Edward III. A copy of the charter hangs in St Peter's Church in the village. The fair aims to raise funds for local charities, this year Axminster Food Bank and ARC (Axminster Recovery through Counselling). In addition, funds are also distributed to village organisations.

A major attraction for 2023 was that the fair was opened by our own local Olympian Marcus Wyatt a leading member and medal winner of the British skeleton bob team.

Many of the usual attractions were there ready to be enjoyed again – cow splottery, coconut shy, skittles, bouncy castle and assault course as well as tip the lazy. The bar and barbecue were very well attended as was the tea tent on the Jubilee Field where customers were entertained by The Red Arrows Majorettes. Another attraction was the craft and produce tent which drew entries for vegetables, jams and cakes plus pictures, photographs or handmade articles. This is an area the fair committee is hoping to expand next year

The fair was laid out as a mixture of games interspersed with stallholders and craft enthusiasts where visitors could have a go at traditional fair games, watch a walking stick being carved, sheep being sheared or buy some handmade knitwear.

The return of the dog show was very popular and visitors marvelled at the speed and skill with which the dogs and their handlers negotiated the courses following which they could enter their own dogs in a variety of classes for the

dog show.

The fair could not happen without the immense amount of support and involvement of a great number of people throughout the year in preparing materials or planning and organisation; in the week before in setting up and preparing and baking cakes; on the day itself running stalls, manning the car park and gates, cooking food and pulling pints; and clearing up on the days following the fair.

If anyone has any suggestions on how the organisers can improve things please attend to the Dalwood Fair annual meeting and 'thank you' evening on Sunday, October 15th at 7pm in the village hall.

The fair committee would like to thank all those people who helped in so many ways to make this year's fair such a success. Committee members would particularly like to thank all the visitors who came and supported the event, hopefully they all enjoyed the fair so much that they will come back next year and bring their friends with them.

I don't want it to be a place where life is a struggle and where certain areas are too degraded to live in.

I would be very pleased to talk with anyone who would like to know more, who maybe would like to go through the ECO Church Survey so that they can also consider eco areas that maybe they had not considered before. Perhaps we could complete a personal carbon footprint together, or, you could complete one alone. There is a carbon footprint calculator online which the Open University has created, amongst others — https://students.open.ac.uk/candc/carbon\_calculator.

This calculator can just take 10 minutes to complete. You might ask why bother calculating your carbon

footprint? It gives us a good idea of where we are now and what we can do to each reduce our carbon footprint. It is a bit like the survey in that it brings up areas that we might not have considered before, it helps to quantify these areas with regards to our carbon footprint and it might show us that with small changes in lifestyle improvements can be made.

There are areas where it will be very difficult to reduce our footprint, in these instances it might mean that a change in shopping and purchasing habits will help. I would encourage all to at least look at this and to maybe take ten minutes out to calculate your Footprint.

As I have said, I would be very pleased to help with this, especially with those who may struggle with the internet, or who do not have access to the internet. Together let us make this planet better and cooler bit by bit. Let us take care of God's creation.

SUNDAY afternoon regulars at the King's Arms have become accustomed to being entertained by some excellent contemporary musicians.

Perhaps Sunday, September 17th provided some of the best music to date. With the experienced Scott Philips – solo artist of the afternoon along with Ollie Fuller (aka Nature Boi) solo debuting those in the pub were treated to an outstanding afternoon of lively and well-known tunes – a listen to and sing-a-long session – plus a little dancing over-spilling the skittle alley.

This was not Scott's first time at the pub – hence the key afternoon spot belonged to him and young son Ronnie (ably accompanying him on the tambourine).

This was no ordinary run-of-the-mill performance – whilst this was a solo gig, Scott is normally in situ as the front man with the Honiton-based band, Sweet Black Angels, with four signature albums released: Beneath the Shadows (2004), Expect the Waking (2007), Head for the Horizons (2020) and the most recent 25 Best of Sweet Black Angels (2022), plus a new release pending.

The band has been performing and supporting groups such as The Levellers, The Specials and the Pogues for over 27 years and have played at the Exeter and Liverpool Caverns, the O2 Arena and, more recently, at the Noel Gallagher after the show party as well as more local venues including the Honiton Beehive and Escot Centre. Any check of Wikipedia will reveal the extensive listing of their albums, singles and played arenas

This was no ordinary Sunday afternoon session so more than well done to the pub for securing such a gem.

In contrast, Ollie Fuller is without doubt an up-and-coming young musician and singer. With but a few soloperformances behind him, he demonstrated a genuine young and enthusiastic talent. He is an accomplished loop pedal player (cited as the next generation music gear), as well as guitarist, ukelele, keyboard, bass guitar and banjo player: some musician in the making.

Whilst today was a solo gig, he has grown up in a musical family – playing in their band Jam on Toast which recently featured at the Goren Festival for the third year running along with other local appearances. Hopefully Ollie will be back on stage at the King's Arms soon – solo and band perhaps?

Again, the pub excelled in providing an exceptional popular music afternoon one which was clearly most appreciated by the customers.

# Village cream tea splendour

'O weathercock on the village spire, With your golden feathers all on fire. Tell me what can you see from your perch

THERE will have been many churches which would lay claim to Longfellow's view of beyond the tower – referenced in Bryan Drew's book, A Journey Through the History of Stockland – and indeed Stockland church must have lived up to be worthy of such poetic acclaim in the cream tea offered in its churchyard on the first Sunday of September by Trish Bass and her team.

What a setting for a cream tea – a centuries old church yard bathed in brilliant afternoon sunshine, the church bells softly ringing and a cream tea served in very much a traditional format.

Waitresses with pinafores, tiered cake plates, delicately trimmed sandwiches, bite-sized delicacies – all providing a step back in time – the setting almost stood still offering a time-warp of village communal life reminiscent of bygone days.

Indeed, for an afternoon time stood still reminiscent of the lines 'yet stands the church clock at ten to three? And is there honey still for tea' ... 'until the



centuries blend and blur' (The Old Vicarage, Grantchester: Rupert Brooke).

Any fears that a Saturday afternoon might deter 'guests' soon dissipated: the churchyard was packed with tables festooned with floral decorations and crisply ironed table cloths prior to the 2.30pm start.

Cometh the hour and the area was becoming exceptionally busy until every seat every table was taken.

And supposedly when the sun shines, when the company is good and when

the setting is ideal what better than to stay until it really is time to leave.

This was an afternoon to appreciate the church, the village and the very generous villagers who organised and provided the teas and goodies.

The village spirit was certainly fostered through this event. Thank you to all who really did provide an afternoon to savour and remember.

The total raised was a staggering and much rewarding £522.70 with £300 donated to the Bell Tower Fund and £222.70 to the Flower Fund.





### The real ordeal

THE horror and the aftermath of an aviation disaster – a plane crash into a block of flats – Nightingale Point (the book's title): a London tower block "lit up like a flare ... dense smoke pours from its flame-filled windows and burning debris falls to the ground".

A tragedy of such immense proportions is frequently signalled in the event on the day (Lockerbie and 9/11, for example) not in the long term, even life-long repercussions wrought upon the survivors. Rarely is the full impact revealed or indeed known or understood: what effects, long term, does disaster have on those who remain? Can their inner suffering be revealed in a novel form?

Here the survivors have moved on five years and whilst the author reveals the changes to people's lives – each being distinct and believable – there is a sense of some being more authentic than others. Perhaps this is summed up in the telling comment: "Getting out of the building should have been the hardest thing we had to do," one survivor says to another. Adding: "But sometimes it feels like that was only the start."

Arguably, the author has initiated the need to see beyond tragedy recognising how lives are changed – even radically altered – accounting for the positives and the negatives of survival.

A worthwhile and astonishingly thought-provoking read – prompting a what-might-happen scenario with perhaps the more recent tragedies in mind.

Further reading from the group included: The Slow Worm Song (Andrew Miller); Lessons (Ian Mckeown); The House of Doors (Tan Twan); Black Fox Running; (Brian Carter); Birds and People (Mark Cocker); and the Tim Pears West Country Trilogy: The Horseman, The Wanderers and The Redeemed all three offering a huge and enjoyable slice of rural Devon. Such recommendations are invaluable and certainly encourage wider reading habits.

The next novel for discussion is Outline (Rachel Cusk).


# School's shared thoughts

The final uphill walk, past Lower and Higher Seavington to enter a gate to go down through Aller Farm fields, over two railway sleepers and back to the church for more refreshments.

The circular walk was 3.5 miles and sponsorship money pledged so far is £236.50 which will be shared equally between the Devon Historic Churches Trust and Stockland church.

# Helpful advice for all the hedgehogs

A WELL-ATTENDED meeting of Umborne Social Club heard all about the work of The Hedgehog Hut in Colyford.

Alison Foxcroft and a group of volunteers are ready to help with any hedgehogs in trouble from predators or disease.

They have been running for five years and the numbers of hogs being brought in are increasing. In conjunction with Coombefield Veterinary Hospital, they are able to restore many of them to the wild after treatment.

Hedgehogs are nocturnal, so if you see one out in the day, it could be ill, especially if it has flies around it or is unsteady. Please call 07305129160 for help and advice.

We were reminded that the traditional bread and milk humans put out for hedgehogs is in fact unhealthy for them; kitten kibble is a much better option.

Also even the 'natural environment friendly slug pellets have a toxin within them which can kill these delightful creatures, so please avoid using them if possible. And of course check bonfires before lighting them this autumn.

The next meeting is on October 5th at 7.30pm when Adrian Bayley will talk about bats in the Umborne valley.

up of five strands.


They will seek to:

- 5. Establish a focal ministry for young people and teens with a focus on supporting mental,


spiritual, emotional and physical health





# **ARE YOU FEELING BIN-SPIRED?**

WE are all familiar with the items we can put in our green recycling boxes and sacks for kerbside.

East Devon residents are pretty good at recycling and it is reported that the rate is 60 per cent. I am sure we are all ace when it comes to flattening cardboard and cereal boxes and washing and squashing tins and cans! That really helps the process, as more can be fitted into the lorries which, in turn, means less journeys back to the depot with full loads.

#### Small electricals and cables

Apart from being able to put out small electricals (bagged separately) on top of our green boxes, the recyclers will also take redundant cables which may be lurking in a drawer or cupboard.

It is estimated that in the UK we hoard enough cables to circle the earth more than five times, so this is a great way to save the valuable materials contained in these items.

#### **Batteries** (vapes)

Spent batteries too can be put out, in a separate bag, for collection. With the exception of disposable vapes and e-cigarette batteries. These batteries differ in make-up and materials from the usual household batteries and if placed in the recycling, can cause explosions and fires at the recycling plants. They should be kept out of the general waste bins for the same reason. If you are a vaper, you will probably be aware that any retailer selling vapes, has a legal duty to take back the spent batteries and store them safely for disposal.

The Government website gives information on this. Veolia, Biffa and Devon Contract Waste have put into place a collection service for vape batteries, so if the retailer is not aware of this, you could share this information (not to mention that retailers could be fined up to £5000 for not having a vape return system in place)! 80% of the 'ingredients' can be recycled.

#### Soft plastics

The area of the recycling of soft plastics via local supermarkets is also a murky area. Is it really doing consumers a service, or is it greenwashing?

We have to ask ourselves what happens to this plastic, where is it sent to be dealt with, which country is it going to be dumped upon?


The statistic is that 40 per cent of the UK's single-use plastic is sent abroad, ostensibly for recycling. It has been proven\* that much of the this waste stream is left on the side of roads or burnt, causing harm to the people of those countries.

The alternatives are, to place the plastic in your general waste bin, which will be incinerated (with stringent emissions checks) and used to produce electricity to power local homes.

Or, even better, try to change to foods not wrapped in s.u.p. It is something for us all to consider carefully.
