THE last five psalms in the psalter (Psalms 146-150) are all devoted to praise.

Among them, Psalm 147 does not falter in fulfilling this aim. Its three sections (vs. 1-6, 7 -11 and 12 - 21) seek to inspire praise for everything in heaven and earth, including, as you might expect to find in the Hebrew scriptures, praise for God's special relationship with Israel.

PSALM 147

1. Alleluia. How good it is to make music for our God, how joyful to honour him with praise.

2. The Lord builds up Jerusalem and gathers together the outcasts of Israel.

3. He heals the broken hearted and binds up all their wounds.

4. He counts the number of the stars and calls them all by their names.

5. Great is our Lord and mighty in power; his wisdom is beyond all

telling.

6. The Lord lifts up the poor, but casts down the wicked to the ground.

7. Sing to the Lord with thanksgiving; make music to our God upon the lyre;

8. Who covers the heavens with clouds and prepares rain for the earth:

9. Who makes grass to grow upon the mountains and green plants to serve our needs.

10. He gives the beasts their food and the young ravens when they cry.

11. He takes no pleasure in the power of a horse, no delight in human strength.

12. But the Lord delights in those who fear him, who put their trust in his steadfast love.

13. Sing praise to the Lord, O Jerusalem; praise your God, O Zion;

14. For he has strengthened the bars of your gates and has blest your children within you.

15. He has established peace in your borders and satisfies you with the finest wheat.

16. He sends forth his command to the earth and his word runs very swiftly.

17. He gives snow like wool and scatters the hoarfrost like ashes.

18. He casts down his hailstones like morsels of bread; who can endure his frosts?

19. He sends forth his word and melts them; he blows with his wind and the waters flow.

20. He declares his word to Jacob, his statutes and judgements to Israel.

21. He has not dealt so with any other nation; they do not know his laws. Alleluia.

Author releases new book on local birds

LOCAL naturalist, wildlife author and Kilmington parishioner Michael Tyler has written another book, Birds of the

Lower Axe Valley, including the renowned Seaton Wetlands.

The book has been produced i n partnership with East Devon District Council (EDDC) with over 300 species of birds recorded and referred to in the book. The status of each species is listed, together with colour photographs

and migration details of many birds ringed or recovered in the area.

After careful research of 19th Century literature, the author gleaned considerable information on the status of the local birdlife, especially along the River Axe and its hinterland, which had not been published more recently.

The book covers a geological area extending from Branscombe to the Undercliff, north along the river valley to

the Dorset and Somerset border. This book will be of interest to local people who are proud of the local environment and its birdlife, as well as, the historical ornithological information going back more than two centuries.

Michael Tyler has written several books and articles on natural history, including: The Birds of Devon, a complete avifauna of Devon; and award winning British Oaks - A

Concise Guide.

The hardback book is expected to be available from early December and copies priced at £15 can be purchased from the author via email: mwtyler2@googlemail.com and from EDDC at the Lookout at Seaton Wetlands during office hours.

DALWOOD Country Fair 2022 boasted record-breaking visitor numbers — exactly 1,000 adults paid at the gate, as children enter free, and it is estimated over 2,000 visitors.

Dalwood Fair Committee could not have planned and delivered the event without teams of volunteers. Whilst everyone cannot be thanked personally, mention and huge thanks must be given to Martin Farrendon and Mr and Mrs Humphries, as without the use of the field there would be no fair. Fair opener Stafford Seward also did us proud alongside Nick Goodwin, Axminster Town Crier.

On the day, over £11,000 was raised with DFC having held a reserve fund towards costs for next year such as insurance and booking fees. A £2,000plus float is needed for all the stalls on the day. There is a need to repair, maintain or replace and purchase new

equipment as required. Looking to the future, the old trailer must be replaced, which is necessary to store all the large stall equipment, games, and more safely and securely.

Keeping the reserve means at the recent annual meeting we were able to distribute £7,525 to the following:

Dalwood Country Fair 2022 beneficiaries: £250 Martin Farrenden; £50 Donated — request from those that kindly allowed the use of their generator to Children's Hospice Southwest.

External 2022 nominated charities: £462 Axminster Care Services; £462 Axminster Food Bank.

Village charities and organisations: £1,260 Dalwood Village Hall Trust 20 per cent; £1,197 St Peter's Church 19 per cent; £1,008 Dalwood Recreation Trust 18 per cent; £945 Reading Room 15 per cent; £945 The Methodist Chapel 15 per cent; £378 Raft Club 6 per cent; £315 Badminton Club 5 per cent; £252 Corrydale Players (formally Corrydale Singers) 4 per cent.


The call to remember led by Commander Stafford Seward, under the watchful eye of RBL standard bearer Richard Norman.


ALL inhabitants of Stockland and its surrounding hamlets know Stockland Victory Hall, without doubt.

The hall is where the Christmas lunch, the harvest lunch, quiz nights, local craft markets, fish and chip evenings and indeed many more of such have been held. It is the pivotal base of the Stockland annual event — the Stockland Fair and, along with the King's Arms, it provides a focal point for the community and, like the pub, the hall has been updated to high specifications.

Take the familiar entrance — spot the re-siting and significant expansion of the bar and kitchen opening, so much easier access. The bar is now so much larger – and much easier to work behind. Behind the hatch, a sparkling new kitchen with plenty of space and storage, all squeaky clean and so fresh. Then the small lounge, once an over-spill area for teas, coffees for various events or a somewhat hived-off separated area for meetings with perhaps an austere feeling but now a cheerful carpeted lounge furnished with brightly upholstered comfy seating.

The main kitchen has increased storage, refrigeration capacity and the so much necessitated brighter lighting. The small rooms off the main hall have given the extra storage capacity warranted to house the newer usage of the hall for the youth club, for example.

Then there is the outside patio -



again a new addition — and also giving people the additional outdoor space to congregate and view the activities taking place in the adjacent field.

The benches in this area were donated by Stockland Cricket Club — a generous gesture but sadly out of their funds left through the club's closure. So, thanks to the cricketers due here in enhancing the hall's facilities.

Devon Historic Graffiti Survey team pays a visit to Shute's church

IN November, a team of volunteers from the Devon Historic Graffiti Survey, led by archaeologist Dr Pru Manning, visited Shute to record traces of ancient graffiti in the parish.

Shute, containing as it does many old buildings, is rich in historic graffiti. The survey recorded over 90 examples, some of which may date back hundreds of years.

The survey is mainly concerned with Devon churches, but in the case of Shute it was given the opportunity to examine a number of structures. This included Shute Barton, Shute Gatehouse, and Shute Piers, as well as the church.

Shute Gatehouse offers some of the most visible examples of historic graffiti. The stones on either side of the gate include initials and designs along with dates, some of which go back to the 1600s. Some initials can be tentatively identified. "JGP" on the right hand side of the Gatehouse may be Sir John George Reeve de la Pole, 8th Baronet of Shute — he did not acquire the middle name of "Reeve" until later in life.

Inside Shute Barton, the survey identified a number of medieval taper burn marks in the timbers. These were made with the intention of protecting the house, based on the premise that if timber is burnt once it could not be burned again. The burn marks may also have been seen as providing protection from other harms.


Around a number of doors, openings and windows in the Church and Shute Barton, "V V" marks were identified. The symbol is often referred to as a 'Marian mark' as it has traditionally been associated with the medieval cult of the Virgin Mary. The Vs are thought to have once stood for 'Virgo Virginum'



— Virgin of Virgins or inverted, as M, for Maria, possibly deriving extra significance from having the same meaning whichever way up it was. The mark is thought to have had a protective function.

By the west door of the church, a daisy-wheel or hexafoil design was also found. This is thought to have had a protective function. On the south door, there is also a conspicuous Mass Dial, which was likely used in the manner of a sundial before the Reformation to indicate the time for the daily offices.

A considerable amount of the graffiti in the church is more recent. Behind the organ, the blowers who operated the bellows have left not only their names and lengths of service, but also caricatures of previous vicars, and also messages. One marks the first year anniversary of the start of the Second World War. Moreover, in the bell tower, normally kept locked, generations of bell ringers have inscribed their names. These inscriptions will be of considerable interest to local historians and genealogists.

The graffiti in the church and around Shute form an important and visible part of its rich history. Be sure to look out for it the next time you visit!

Archaeological project records church 'graffiti' across Devon

THE Devon Historic Graffiti Survey is a Devon Archaeological Society project, aiming to identify and record the historic graffiti in Devon's churches.

The surveys are showing how widespread the phenomenon of church graffiti is and challenging formerly held beliefs about it.

The findings are fascinating and provide, among other things, a rare insight into the concerns and beliefs of ordinary parishioners, through something that was created directly by them.

There are more than 600 parish churches in Devon, some 475 of which

are ancient. Investigations to date indicate the vast majority of churches have surviving graffiti, and that much of it is of considerable interest. Information can be found at devonhistoricalgraffiti.org.uk.

On October 13th, Geoffrey Berry welcomed representatives from the graffiti survey to St John the Baptist, to highlight some of the historic graffiti that had been identified.

They took 98 photographs, with the majority of graffiti on the porch door arches as well as the tower stairs door arch. There was also graffiti on the pillars and pews and a little external graffiti. Most of the graffiti was old but the majority impossible to date.

Three examples are:

a) W, crossed I, 1678?

b) Writing, possibly name, maybe upside-down – inner porch door, east side

c) Hexafoil, a ritual protection mark – tower stairs door arch, west end

It is hoped that the findings at St John the Baptist will be added to the project website, the Devon Historic Environment Record and eventually fed into a national database.

The website is very interesting and shows graffiti from other Devon churches and information on how the graffiti can be interpreted.

You may already know of some graffiti in your church or perhaps you could start a graffiti search! You never know what you may find...


Week 2 — Give gifts that people

Week 3 — Source gifts that are ethically made or Fairtrade or give a subscription or a charity gift. Set your family and/or your friends a Charity Shop Christmas Challenge, attempting to purchase all or some of your gifts this year. Week 4 — Buy recyclable wrapping paper. Try to avoid shiny metallic or foiled paper. Reuse all the brown paper that comes in packaging and tie it up with attractive ribbons or string, which can then be reused. If you can't manage without sticky tape, then plastic-free tape is available locally from Axminster Printers in West Street.

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
