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TO MOW OR **NOT TO MOW?**



It's not often that discussions get "heated" in The Vicarage. There are one or two topics that might see the temperature rise a little, but none quite the same as the debate that has taken place during May and which will carry on into June and July.

"Whatever can you be discussing?" I hear you cry. Well, it is this - to mow or not to mow, that is the question!

One side of the Lomas dining room table looks out on the 'no mow' area of lawn, and the other side looks out onto the 'mow side'. We have discovered we need to change seats in order to view our preferred lawn! I am going to leave you in suspense as to which of us prefers the long grass, and who prefers the shorter side.

The 'no mow May' campaign began as a way to encourage us to let nature have more of a say in our gardens, and green spaces - you may have noticed local councils now leave the verges on the sides of the roads to grow a little longer;



churchyards might be leaving a 'wild area' or mowing paths through the gravestones to make it clear the plantlife is intentional, and not neglect. There is always that little niggle, that someone might complain!

The benefits to nature of a few extra inches are increased flowers and more variety, attracting insects and birds, and in fact longer grass has deeper roots which means it can survive better if we have a dry summer. The practicalities of mowing long grass when a sit-on mower is not available, and skills with a scythe are non-existent may be worth taking into consideration!

Why these ramblings? I happen to be reading a book called, Rewilding the Church by Steve Aisthorpe. I am going to recommend it as my 'book of the summer' as Mr Aisthorpe sets out to remind us that the church has its roots in agriculture, in landscape, in the wild places, and that as followers of Jesus Christ we must have a relationship with the natural world, and be willing to take on the adventure of faith. I am confident the bookshop in Axminster can order you a copy should you be interested in the title!

I will be taking my book and a cup of tea into the garden during the next few weeks – will you join me?

WHILST both these psalms make it clear that the Lord is in control, one is very much an individual's perspective.

Each member of the flock may be sure that it is reliant on the shepherd, even when taken through the most dangerous of ravines; all will be well; my cup shall be full: I will dwell. In the house of the Lord for ever.

Psalm 24, on the other hand, reflects deliberations of pilgrims as they prepare to enter the gates of Jerusalem and approach the Lord's holy place; who shall enter and receive a blessing from the Lord? Their excitement is enhanced by recalling their nation's assurance that when the sacred Arc of the Covenant entered the city gates, so did the King of Glory.



PARISHES ORGANISE AID FOR UKRAINE

ON Easter Monday morning, I met up with other volunteers in Kilmington at Millers Farm Shop.

Our aim was to deliver almost five tons of medical supplies, medicines, toiletries and other much-needed items to people in great need of it as a result of the war in Ukraine. All the items had been kindly donated by local people.

We travelled to the Poland-Ukraine border in two ambulances supplied by Toadpit Medical Services, of Ottery St Mary, a journey of almost 1,300 miles. We drove in shifts throughout Monday night and Tuesday covering approximately 200 miles each at a time, arriving at the border on Tuesday evening having slept for short periods in the vehicles whilst still moving. On Wednesday, we delivered aid to a refugee camp in Poland and another destination hub for the items to be transferred to other aid stations.

The resolve of the refugees was humbling and the aid greatly appreciated by them and all the volunteer workers from many parts of the globe. On route back to our base, we diverted to the Ukraine border to plan for our crossing into Ukraine the next day. There we visited another aid centre established by volunteer groups from many nations who had set up the site in gazebos and tents; again, we were able to give medicines and medical aid to them.

Early Thursday morning, we set off for Ukraine, our destination two hospitals in L'viv, 75km over the border. Thorough security checks are in operation at the border and even though we were fast-tracked due to having temperature sensitive drugs on board, our crossing into Ukraine still took almost three hours.

On route to L'viv, we passed a garage which had been subjected to a missile attack a few days earlier. We paused to see the destruction and witnessed locals clearing up



and trying to continue their normal daily lives. As we continued our journey air raid sirens sounded but, fortunately, there were not any incidents at the hospitals in L'viv, one of which was a children's hospital. We were again warmly greeted and the gratitude for our efforts was immense and the supplies much needed.

Our journey back to Poland was at best arduous, the roads badly broken and potholed which limited our speed to little more than a jogging pace. Once back at our base in Poland, we gave our remaining supplies to some doctors who visited us there. Although all the places we visited needed much aid it was humbling to see the people only take the items they could use at that moment so that there was enough for others.

On Friday morning, we started the long journey home, arriving back in Devon on Saturday afternoon having travelled 3,000 miles.

Travelling through Ukraine, seeing defences being constructed from sandbags, tyres and iron girders made us realise the impact of the war. Hearing stories from volunteers based there and seeing refugees driven from their homes having collected their possessions in their

arms in moments, not knowing if they would ever return to their homes or where they would go, was probably one of the most emotional times any of us had experienced. At the time of writing this article, the team are travelling back to the camps on their fourth mission. Further trips are already being planned.

On behalf of the Ukrainian people, massive thanks goes to everyone who has donated items and funds. Without your help it would not have been possible. If you have any items to donate such as medications — in or out of date — medical items or toiletries and long-life foods, they can be deposited at Dalwood Village Shop; Kings Arms pub, Stockland; Talbot Arms pub, Uplyme; and



SUSAN Lilian Rickards was born in Taunton on May 25th 1938. Her arrival was not without its challenges as she was born with a hip disability and spent her early years in plaster not being able to run around with others.

She attended primary school in Taunton and having passed the 11-plus exam, moved on to Bishop Fox's Girls' Grammar School and later Millfield School, near Glastonbury. She then attended Bristol Technical College and it was there that she met Jim Metcalfe whom she married in 1963.

She originally trained as a therapeutic radiographer. However, she and Jim decided to change careers and both trained as teachers. Susan loved children and,

as well as being very good and encouraging, she had no problems keeping order! Teaching took the couple to Maidenhead and then Marlow where they spent many years. Jim's hobby was sailing and so they joined Maidenhead Sailing Club, with Susan helping with the teaching of children learning to sail Optimist class yachts and they organised an 'Opy camp' every year.

As Head of Year at Cox Green School in Maidenhead, part of her remit was to review the files of new pupils. In 1974, the three-inch-thick file of a particularly troubled 11-year-

old came up for discussion and the headteacher was not keen to sign off on this admission. However, Susan was determined to help this young lad and she and Jim went on to foster Eddie.

Eddie joined the Army and was able to invite Sue to a garden party at Buckingham Palace when the Lifeguards performed the Standards Parade. Eddie was not on a horse, he was driving a tank on The Mall.

Fast forward a decade or so, and Sue was a proud and adoring 'Granny' to Eddie's four children and two great-grandchildren. A visit to Granny Sue's was a real treat. They always had her undivided attention, jam-making in the kitchen, exploring the wonders of nature, fish and chips at the seaside or sharing

her love of music, from opera to musicals and all places in between.

Sue was an inspiration to Eddie on so many levels, teaching him that it is possible to trust, that no matter what, he is part of her family and always will be. Sharing her love of learning, pushing him to be the best he could be and more than anything, giving him the belief in himself that she so clearly had in him. Sue took Eddie in when no-one else wanted to and while they may not have been related by blood, something much more powerful binds them, love, forever.

Jim's mother had purchased and renovated Church Cottages so when she died, the couple moved to Dalwood and Sue took a teaching post at Axminster Secondary School. Jim then died suddenly at home in 1993.

Susan was very musical. Her hobby was singing, she loved male voice choirs, she took singing lessons and sung as an alto with the Exeter Festival Chorus. She was also a member of the Corrydale

Singers and took to the stage with them for the first time in 1987. Susan was also a member of St Peter's Church choir for many years.

Susan met Jim Giles while participating in dog shows. They married in 2000 in St Peter's Church, Dalwood, and enjoyed seven happy years together before Jim unfortunately, developed dementia and died in a care home.

Graham Hunnisett and Susan met in 1979 when they were both members of Maidenhead Sailing Club and they were married on the June 4th 2016 at Dalwood Methodist Church.

In addition to a busy family life, Susan was involved in running both the church youth club, where she organised the village Christmas post deliveries, and the mother and toddler group. She also taught a mathematics course at the adult education college in Seaton.

Susan was one of Dalwood's characters and she will be sorely missed.

BAY Cottage commands a central place in the heart of Shore Bottom; many will know it for its spectacular array of huge white summer flowering pompom hydrangeas (Annabelle) in the gravelled driveway or its roadside hedgerow, again of hydrangeas, but of the most stunning deep blue and scarlet blooms.

Both arrays are show stoppers. Others will know the house from its wall colours – a subtle pink hew – indeed. The owners of the property, Jasper Tubbs and Margaret Martin, are well-known in the village having lived in the area for many years.

They took on Bay Cottage 15 years ago; in fact, they literally demolished the original building, tucking its replacement neatly into the surrounding hillside. Having built the new house, they turned to the terrace and the landscaping of the garden – the latter dropping down from the terrace and softly rolling into the surrounding countryside and turbary.

From the terrace – a steep incline - well stocked borders are seen to surround the immaculately-trimmed expanse of lawn which graduates down to the wildlife pond beyond which lies an area currently smothered with white and purple Fritillaria Meleagris and wild primroses. Grassland stretches beyond – the land here has recently been converted into a wild flower meadow and as yet hopefully will prove itself from May onwards. This is still very much a garden in the making - a work - well like all gardens, an ever-on-going labour of



love

This garden will now be open to the public on Sunday, June 26th, 2.30pm-5pm, offering the chance to see how a garden has developed and what challenges such land offers to further planting. The open afternoon will be organised by the Friends of St Michael's Stockland Committee with all proceeds going to the church fabric. The invitation is to browse and wander freely whilst children and, dogs on leads are welcome.

Parking will be on the lower field – someday itself perhaps to be planted thus extending the garden. Directions will be signed from Oak Cross and Stockland Village – and,

no, it will not rain.

The owners will be on hand throughout the afternoon to enthusiastically regale visitors with information about the planting and garden development. They are rightly proud of their hard-earned achievements.

Whilst supporting an excellent cause, seeing someone else's garden is always stimulating – ever a joy. They very much look forward to your support.

Ćream teas, a plant stall and a bric-a-brac stand will also be available, all hosted by Margaret and Jasper and Friends of St Michael's Church, Stockland.

There will also be refreshments on board, and there will be a charity auction on the return journey.


In the event of rough seas, the cruise will explore the lower reaches of the Taw and Torridge, after which visitors may make their way to Clovelly for the rest of the day.



Lessons in perseverance

WE at St John the Baptist Church were joined by our friends from Yarcombe Baptist Chapel on May 8th for the All Age Service, which was entitled, Perseverance.

These were collected in an upturned umbrella, pictured below left, and offered to God in our prayers later in the service.

The talk finished with Romans 5. 3-5, a very apt reading about perseverance: '...we also rejoice in our sufferings, because we know that suffering produces perseverance; perseverance character; and character, hope.

"And hope does not put us to shame, because God's love has been poured out into our hearts through the Holy Spirit, who has been given to us."



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LET'S brush up on the facts.... how long do you think it takes a plastic toothbrush to degrade?

Why not swap to toothbrushes made of bamboo? They are not expensive now.

Bamboo is the fastest growing plant on the planet and the type used is called Moso.

It is organic and grows wild, thus not needing any fertilisers, pesticides or irrigation. Best of all, no pandas are deprived of their favourite dish!

Also, look for brushes with natural plant-based bristles, rather than the



traditional nylon. If you use an electric toothbrush, bamboo heads

are available and some companies even include a pre-paid label to return them.

Whilst there isn't an ideal solution currently, bamboo takes up to 10 years to breakdown in the environment, which is a vast improvement on plastic and is a big step towards reducing our plastic waste.

No need to throw away your current plastic toothbrush though; repurpose it for cleaning!

We all have a choice. If yours is to continue using a plastic toothbrush, there is a specialist recycling scheme organised by Terracycle and the local collection point is Axminster Dental Practice. However, the planet will thank you for giving plastic the brush-off.



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
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
