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SUMMER: IT'S ALL ABOUT THE SHOES

IT'S the summer season at last and how do I know? Well, mostly because I have put my winter shoes and boots away, and I am now more likely to be seen wearing sandals.

Our footwear is fascinating I think — I am very blessed to own more than one pair of shoes, and this is something so many in our world cannot say.

I do not own a vast collection, unless you talk to my husband who says that I probably do!

When we wear shoes or sandals, we often have certain footwear for certain occasions or roles — for example, Welly boots for farm visits or shows; walking boots for the latest in our South West Coast Path adventure; sandals for walking on the beach or around the village; trainers

for running, and so on.

This reminds me of a story told by Bishop Robert at Clergy Conference in 2022, which I relay to you now.

A panel of "experts" were being questioned, and for their last question they were asked, what shoes would Jesus wear if he were here today?

The first replied that Jesus would not wear shoes at all, but would go barefoot, in order to feel the deepest connection to the Earth and all creation, and as a reminder to tread gently on the planet.

The second replied that Jesus would wear dancing shoes, because he loved to be with people and where better to celebrate the gift of life than at a party?

The third expert said that Jesus would be wearing shoes of peace as it

says in a verse from Paul's letter to the Ephesians: "And, as shoes for your feet, having put on the readiness given by the gospel of peace." (Ephesians 6:15)

All fabulous answers, with one more to come, the last person on the stage thought about the question and answered with a question: "What shoes are you wearing?" they asked, "Because Jesus walks with all of us all the time and so wears whatever shoes we wear."

I love the question, and I wonder how you would reply?

What shoes will Jesus wear with you today? Whatever your need, whether you go out, or stay at home, look down at your feet and may Jesus speak to you of his presence, his care, his loving kindness and his love.

Bishop of Exeter announces retirement

THE Bishop of Exeter has announced he is to retire on September 30th after more than nine years in the role.

The Rt Rev Robert Atwell was installed as bishop at Exeter Cathedral in July 2014.

He is currently convenor of the bishops in the South West, chair of the Church of England's Liturgical Commission and the Lead Bishop for Rural Affairs. He has been a member of the House of Lords since November 2021.

Bishop Robert said: "There is no ideal time to retire, but this seems like a sensible moment. I will be 69 in August. Last year, I had surgery and, although it was successful, I am increasingly conscious of how precious the gift of life and health is, and I don't want to take it for granted.

"It has been an honour to serve as Bishop of Exeter in this beautiful county with so many historic and amazing churches served by faithful congregations. I have been blessed with a fantastic team of clergy colleagues and diocesan staff and I will miss working with them.

"I know the people of the diocese will continue to live out our vision to grow in prayer, make new disciples and to serve the people of Devon with joy."

Bishop Robert studied theology at St John's College, Durham, before training for ordination in Cambridge and Rome. He served as a curate in the Diocese of London before returning to Cambridge as chaplain of Trinity College for six years and teaching early Christian life and thought.

He spent 10 years as a Benedictine monk in Oxfordshire, returning to parish ministry in London's Primrose Hill. He was appointed Bishop of Stockport in 2008.

During his time as Bishop of Exeter, he championed the role of the rural church, instigating the Growing the Rural Church project and most recently editing the book *How Village Churches Thrive*.

His time in office has also seen the development of the Devon Pilgrim project, the Devon Church Weddings project and social justice work through Transforming Plymouth Together. He steered Devon's 600 Anglican churches through the Covid-19 Pandemic.

Bishop Robert is also patron of Plymouth Marjon University, numerous charities and voluntary agencies including YMCA Exeter, St Petrock's and Devon Historic Churches Trust. He is a trustee of Devon Community Foundation.

He is an accomplished author,

whose works include *Celebrating the Seasons*, *Celebrating the Saints*, *The Contented Life*, *Peace at the Last* (on funeral ministry) and *The Good Worship Guide*.

The Lord Lieutenant of Devon, David Fursdon, said: "It has been my privilege to work with Robert as Bishop of Exeter for eight of his nine years in office. He has indeed, as he set out to do, served the people of Devon with joy."

Bishop Robert will be stepping back from public duties in late July. The Bishop of Crediton, the Rt Rev Jackie Searle, will be Acting Bishop of Exeter pending the appointment of the new bishop.

Bishop Jackie said: "It is an honour to serve with Bishop Robert in this wonderful diocese. His retirement will be a significant loss to us all, and we are deeply thankful for his ministry.

"He will leave a rich legacy that includes his collaborative, prayerful and wise leadership, a strong team, and the Diocesan vision to guide us as we continue to pray, grow and serve the people of Devon with joy.

"It will be my privilege to be Acting Diocesan Bishop through the forthcoming vacancy."

There will be a farewell service for Bishop Robert at Exeter Cathedral in September. Details for this will be shared in due course.

On the Sunday morning, St Giles's Church service was led by the Archdeacon of Exeter, The Venerable Andrew Beane, pictured, above, left, with Chris Thorne.

This was a Mission Community Service so over 80 parishioners were able to attend.

During the service, a number of gifts were handed out by the archdeacon to different people who were present at the service to thank them for their contributions to the local community.

Thanks goes to Anna Crabbe for helping the archdeacon to identify the people whom the gifts should be bestowed upon. This was a duplicate version of what had happened at Westminster Abbey, the previous day, where The King was presented with items such as the orb, the ring, the and the sword.

The gifts presented at St Giles's were slightly different — a pair of rubber gloves, a packet of seeds and a trowel, for instance.

Grateful thanks goes to the archdeacon for taking this service, in Rev Julie Lomas's absence, and to the archdeacon's wife, Catherine, and his daughter, Lucy, who also attended.

Thanks also goes to Catherine for helping to provide the wonderful Children's coronation trail which was laid out over the church grounds.

The floral displays within St Giles's Church were an absolute delight, as expected from Jenny Nickolls and her wonderful helpers and artistes.

A Big Picnic on the Recreation Field was also planned for the village and on the Monday morning, a Big Help Out — the Kilminster Spring Clean Celebration was held.

This was inspired by the Prime Minister who suggested that the country have a Festival of Volunteering in honour of the coronation.

Flower show returns with a story...

DALWOOD prepares to flourish as its eminent flower show makes a return this June with a new topic.

Dalwood Flower Festival will bloom once more after a four-year absence, due to the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic, and will concentrate on 'nursery rhymes' as a theme.

Last held in 2018, the popular local event will be growing greener this summer as its venue aims to be an 'eco church' by aiming for all arrangements to be foam-free.

St Peter's Church, Dalwood, will be the location for the festival, with other highlights held at the village hall.

Organiser Caroline Nunns said: "We are very excited to be able to have a flower festival again as we, and our sister churches, have been unable to host one because of Covid restrictions.

"Our last event was in 2018 when the theme was 'all things bright and beautiful'. This year the theme is 'nursery rhymes' which promises to be

a lot of fun. We are asking local businesses to sponsor an arrangement or donate raffle prizes.

"Local organisations are also being invited to submit an arrangement with around 30 expected."

Funds raised will be shared between St Peter's Church and The Community Waffle House in Axminster, a 100 per cent non-profit café and community space with a menu which centres around its trademark Liège waffles.

Waffle Community is the outreach arm of this enterprise aiming to bring the community together with new ideas and existing groups. The Community Waffle House was chosen after an article appeared in the local press describing the work by the group for the community over the Christmas period.

Festival-goers will be treated to an art exhibition by local artists as well as refreshments, a plant stall and raffle.

The event will run from Friday, June 30th to Sunday, July 2nd, 10am-5pm,



and will be rounded off by a gospel service on the Sunday evening at 6pm.

Entry is free but donations will be shared between the two charities. For further information please contact Caroline Nunns on 07922 106581 or email carolinecunns@gmail.com.

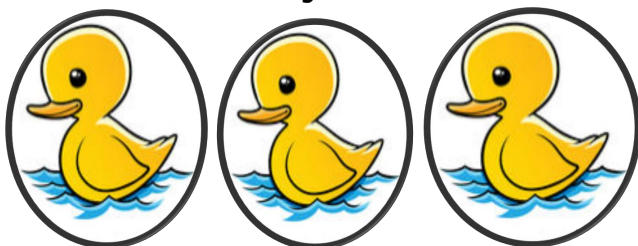

I HAD the incredible opportunity to visit the gardens of Buckingham Palace on Tuesday, March 9th, an experience I will always cherish.

Back in 2020, during the seemingly endless lockdown, I found myself feeling a bit lost, unsure of what to do with my time. It was during this period that a long-distance American pen pal, whom I met on my very first cruise, told me about a charity called Electric Umbrella.

This organisation aims to help young adults with learning difficulties through the power of music.

Electric Umbrella, based in Watford, was primarily conducting in-person sessions before Covid-19 forced all face-to-face gatherings to cease.

However, Steve Joy, the operations manager, assured me that they quickly adapted to online platforms. This shift enabled the charity to expand its reach and connect with numerous individuals with diverse abilities. The atmosphere was like a dream, a pinch-me moment. As the garden party was packed, the only spot I

Although His Majesty The King and Queen Camilla were absent from the Royal Garden Party, I was delighted to see Their Royal Highnesses The Prince and Princess of Wales and Their Royal Highnesses Duke and Duchess of Edinburgh in attendance.

As HRH Prince Williams shook my hand and engaged in a conversation with me, I was overcome with a sense of gratitude and awe. Among the multitude of attendees, he chose to connect with me, instantly putting me at ease with his calming presence.

May this event inspire us all to



embrace the beauty of diversity and extend a hand of kindness to those who may feel marginalised. Let us continue to support organisations like Electric Umbrella and work towards a world where everyone is seen, heard and valued.

The walk was a wonderful and prayerful way, using an old tradition, to give thanks for the blessings of nature around us, and also to bring the community together.

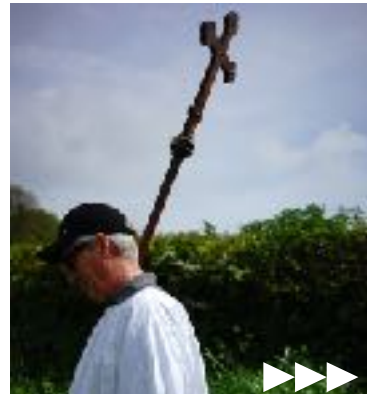

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Secondly, you may not be aware that the coating that the conditioners add to your clothes to make them softer, only serves to lessen their capacity to absorb water and detergent.

These chemicals include carcinogens, hormone-disrupting toxins, and allergens that can contribute to eczema and asthma. Some of the ingredients don't have to be disclosed either. Once these chemicals are washed down the drain they can become highly toxic to

aquatic life too. Vegans may also want to check out the ingredients as some use animal fats in the production of fabric softeners.

The answer? A clean, green alternative is to mix white vinegar with thirty or so drops of essential oil (unless you have skin that is sensitive to these oils) and add it to the appropriate drawer of your machine.

The smell of vinegar will not linger — guaranteed! Or just ditch the fabric conditioners. You will prolong the life of your clothes — and your washing machine too.

So, come on, readers, let's not line the pockets of the already immensely wealthy companies with their clever marketing tactics. It's just a question of adjusting our habits and getting used to a new way of working. Why not give it a go?

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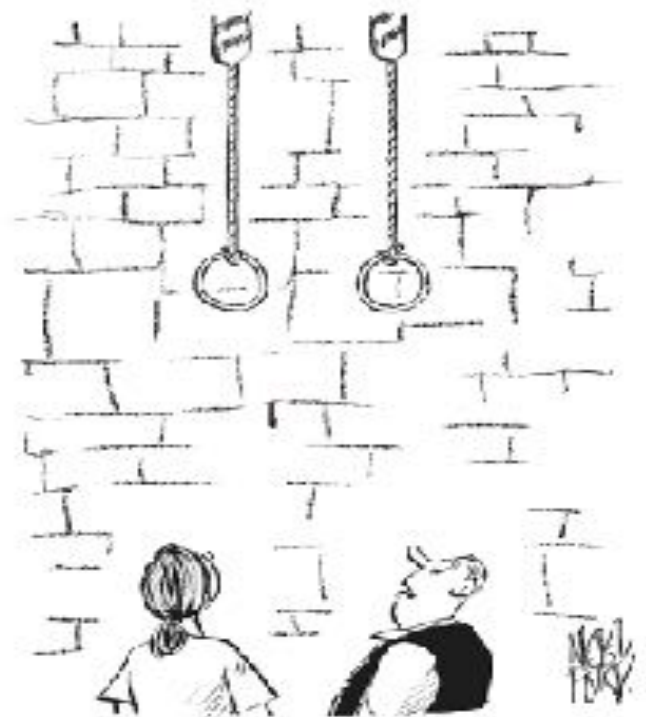
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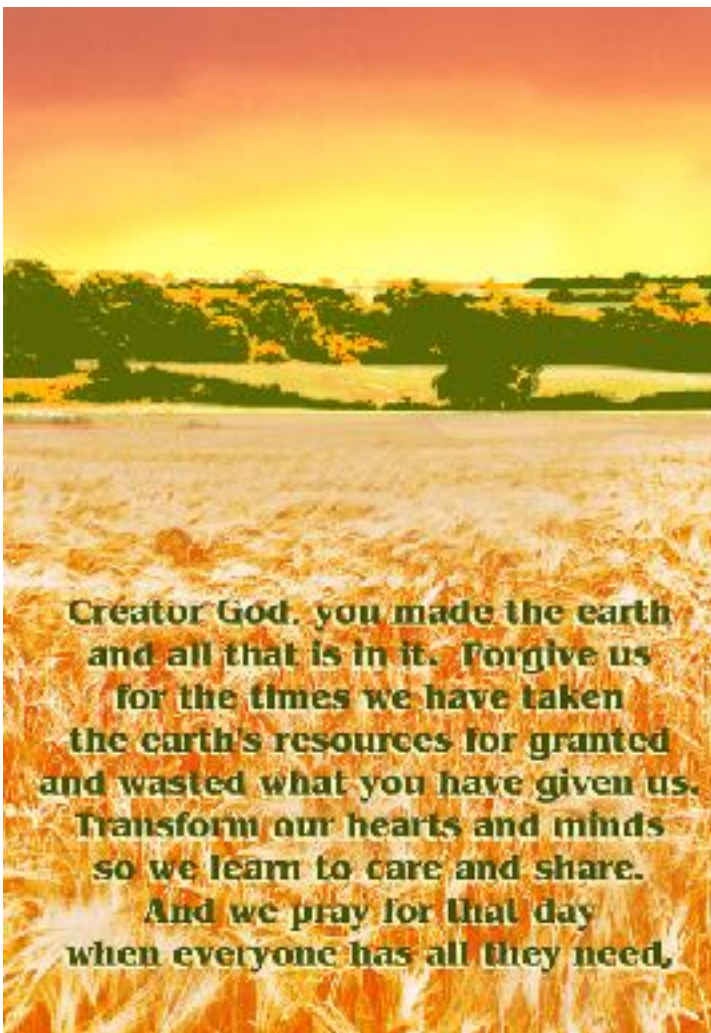
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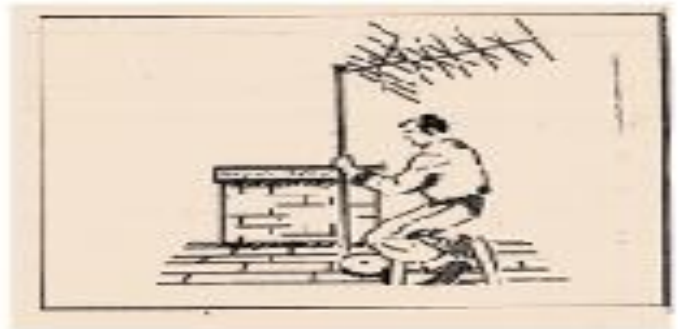
