DEPRESSION, self-pity, wanting to get away from it all, pleading for revenge — all symptoms of disturbed mental health, and which feature in guite a few psalms.

But, and it is a big but, nearly always, as here, deep down there is sure knowledge that it is God who brings deliverance.

PSALM 55

- 1. Hear my prayer, O God; hide not yourself from my petition.
- 2. Give heed to me and answer me; I am restless in my complaining.
- 3. I am alarmed at the voice of the enemy and at the clamour of the wicked;
- 4. For they would bring down evil upon me and are set against me in fury.
- 5. My heart is disquieted within me, and the terrors of death have fallen upon me.
- 6. Fearfulness and trembling are come upon me, and a horrible dread has overwhelmed me.

- 7. And I said: "O that I had wings like a dove, for then would I fly away and be at rest.
- 8. 'Then would I flee far away and make my lodging in the wilderness.
- 9. 'I would make haste to escape from the stormy wind and tempest.'
- 10. Confuse their tongues, O Lord, and divide them, for I have seen violence and strife in the city.
- 11. Day and night they go about on her walls; mischief and trouble are in her midst.
- 12. Wickedness walks in her streets; oppression and guile never leave her squares.
- 13. For it was not an open enemy that reviled me, for then I could have borne it:
- 14. Nor was it my adversary that puffed himself up against me, for then I would have hid myself from him.
- 15. But it was even you, one like myself, my companion and my own familiar friend.
- 16. We took sweet counsel together and walked with the multitude in the house of God.

- 17. Let death come suddenly upon them; let them go down alive to the Pit; for wickedness inhabits their dwellings, their very hearts.
- 18. As for me, I will call upon God and the Lord will deliver me.
- 19. In the evening and morning and at noonday I will pray and make my supplication, and he shall hear my voice.
- 20. He shall redeem my soul in peace from the battle waged against me, for many have come upon me.
- 21 God, who is enthroned of old, will hear and bring them down; they will not repent for they have no fear of God
- 22. My companion stretched out his hands against his friend and has broken his covenant;
- 23. His speech was softer than butter, though war was in his heart; his words were smoother than oil, yet are they naked swords.
- 24. Cast your burden upon the Lord and he will sustain you, and will not let the righteous fall for ever.
- 25. But those who are bloodthirsty and deceitful, O God, you will bring down to the pit of destruction.
- 26. They shall not live out half their days, but my trust shall be in you, O Lord.

Changes for season and Methodist church events

SEPTEMBER 1st sees the start of the Methodist year. No big parties or fireworks in celebration; in fact, it just seems like any other day.

Historically, it has been the time when ministers start at new churches, meeting new congregations for the first time, with both sides sizing up each other. Summer, outdoor events finish, and once again organisations start meeting indoors.

During the summer, Dalwood Methodist Church has been considering some changes that it is felt would be helpful at the chapel. The coffee mornings always used to be on a Wednesday, but sometimes that meant the team could be tied up with that in the morning, and afterwards they would have to scamper to re-arrange the chapel in readiness for art club in the afternoon, as well as get home to have some lunch and be back for 2pm.

To try and ease the pressure, coffee mornings were switched to Mondays, and then Tuesdays, but neither day seemed to suit people, so it has been decided to revert to the original day of Wednesday, at the same time increasing the frequency to once a month. It is hoped that this latest change will enable more people to come to what are friendly occasions. Funds raised always go to charities, usually those that operate in our area.

The 'tea and tots' has also had a name-change and is now known as Babies and Toddlers' Club. As before, it's open between 10am and 11.30am on Mondays (except the last one in the month), and a warm welcome awaits all mums and dads with babies and toddlers up to the age of four. Apart from September 25th, when the harvest festival will be at 3pm, services during September will be at 11am, and a warm welcome is extended to all.

St Giles' Church Annual Appeal 2022: 3rd - 4th September

St Giles' Day is on Sunday 4th September, and it is a tradition of the village to show their support to the church through support for their annual Gift Day appeal. Last year the village gave an amazing and very generous sum of over £7000 for which Rev'd Julie says a huge THANK YOU!



St Giles has been the patron saint of the Church and the Village since the 12th century, and has called people from near and afar to come together to witness all the key moments in community life. Your Parish Church continues to fulfil this longstanding tradition. Here are just some of the ways your money has been used during the past year: mourning the loss of dear friends and neighbours through our funeral ministry; celebrating with those bringing children to be baptised; offering a warm welcome to the little ones at our weekly Baby support Group along with their parents; lighting the beacon on the tower to celebrate the Queen's Jubilee; helping to combat loneliness and isolation by serving home made cakes, coffee, tea and conversation on a Friday morning; keeping the doors open and the lights on so that anyone can enjoy the peace & tranquillity of the church; and worshiping God at one of the regular Church services on offer. One of Rev Julie's biggest challenges and greatest delights was to be interviewed by pupils from Kilmington Primary School.

St Giles is also the patron saint of woodlands, and the church bearing his name is now well on the way towards being accredited as an ECO Church, making small but significant changes in the way

the Church building, the churchyard, and the congregation are being encouraged to take care of all of creation – the recent survey of trees and shrubs carried out in the churchyard by members of the Kilmington Gardening Club revealed there are 26 different varieties of tree, and a further 17 varieties of shrubs. The addition of bird boxes, hedgehog houses and a "Bug Hotel" have all enhanced the outdoor space.

Of course, none of this happens without a wonderful team of volunteers who help in so many different ways – thank you to everyone who comes into the church and churchyard and plays their part. The Church does not receive any funding from any outside agency or from the Government, apart from claiming back any gift aid from donations, which means that support from the wider community all year round, and particularly at this time of year during our Annual Gift Day, is crucial to help us maintain and resource both the building and the ministry of your Parish Church. On Sunday 4th September at 11am, a special service for St Giles' Day will be held to give thanks for all that is good within our village community.

A VILLAGER is calling for all residents to support a petition to improve the condition of Dalwood's "unsafe" roads.

Rob Beak is asking all Dalwood residents and road users into and through the village to support this "most urgent petition".

"Dalwood's roads and lanes are in an appalling and unsafe condition," he says.

"To make Dalwood's roads and lanes safe for all using the main road into Dalwood, especially from Carters Cross into the village and in Sheppard's Knap, from Lea House to Sunnylands Cross — which are in a particularly dangerous condition and in need of urgent and immediate complete re-surfacing.

"Other lanes into and through Dalwood also need most urgent and

immediate attention.

"Your support is needed, alongside that of Dalwood Parish Council, to insist East Devon District Council and Devon County Council Highways to use your taxes to ensure your safety on Dalwood's roads and lanes.

"Please show your support and sign our petition."

Petitions will be in Dalwood Community Shop, The Tuckers Arms, Dalwood Village Hall and The Folly Nursery.

Rob adds: "You may also want to write to your MP, Richard Foord: richard.foords@libdems.ork.uk and lain Chubb EDDC and Devon County Councillor: iain.chubb@devon.co.uk to canvas their support for your right to drive, ride and walk on safe roads in Dalwood.

"I plan to return the signed petition to the next parish council meeting in early September."



DURING August, David Wilsdon accepted an invitation to set up his moth trap in St Giles's churchyard.

It uses a light overnight to attract flying moths which then drop down inside a container amongst egg boxes, which gives them somewhere to shelter until the morning inspection.

A small group from the village assembled early next morning and gathered around to hear David, with some help from David Simpson, gently and methodically go through the specimens. The variety of moths was astounding. There were some 56 different types and 26 species of all shapes, sizes and colour. But then this isn't surprising as we were told there are over 2,500 species of moths in the UK which, when you consider there are some 59 species of butterflies, suggests moths are not getting their fair share of publicity!

Thanks go to both Davids as all, young and old, had a really interesting session checking them out and releasing them.



WHAT is 'lookering'? As part of the Conservation Management projects to protect Stockland parish's turbaries, small groups of ponies are brought in to graze the land over the summer months.

Others can explain the benefits the ponies bring far better than I can so I will just concentrate on what being a lookerer entails, from my perspective.

Last year, I answered a request for volunteers to become a 'lookerer'. I was relieved to be told that I needed no experience with horses or ponies and the whole point was to check and keep a watchful eye on the Exmoors and Dartmoors throughout the duration of their stay in Stockland.

I approached my allotted duties with a certain amount of trepidation. After some guidance and encouragement, generously given by Heather Burnett, I joined a small band of volunteers. There were two groups of ponies. One was located on Quantock Common and the other on Bucehayes. Along with two other volunteers I would perform 'lookering' duties on Quantock every third week on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays. For me, each visit would take about an-hour-and-a-half. I found I only needed to spare a few hours each month.

A typical morning: After driving to the point where the landscape prevents any further vehicular progress I then set off, on foot, with a small bucket of pony nuts, and a whistle. My route takes me along part of the Quantock Common Permissive Path. At the start, I am welcomed by a sign which includes a recommendation to wear Wellingtons! The path is also signposted with little green arrows which, thankfully, have not been subjected to any form of sabotage. I soon encounter my first challenge. A small boggy crossing which is easily traversed by gingerly stepping across an ancient abandoned raft planted firmly in the mud.

I then continue along the trail, part of which is along the top of an ancient bank. Next comes a short hop over a very narrow gurgling stream after

which the trail winds its way through various ferns, mosses and more trees that have finally called it a day. Almost there, I then encounter a stile. This construction, I might add, has recently been upgraded.

With the day's task in sight and just a few metres to go, I stumble along the path which runs alongside the base of a pond. I come across a couple of muddy patches that serve to remind me of the footwear advice at the start of the walk. These muddy areas have been created by the pond overflows. At least I think these are overflows. A leak in the retaining banks could be a problem! A field gate signals journey's end — only 10-15 minutes from my car.

The 'lookering': I am now on a clearing where the ponies are to be fed the pony nuts (food with vitamins). A couple of minutes at this point is taken to decant equal quantities into individual truckles. Then, with a few quick blasts on my referee's whistle, I would summon the ponies. Not a herd but more like a family. Last year's contingent consisted of four Exmoors and four Dartmoors. On most occasions, after a few minutes, they would appear from the hidden depths of the Turbary. However, this year there are seven Exmoors and despite my expert whistling renditions, they often fail to make an appearance. They may not have been observed on this occasion but on subsequent visits, they would be waiting for their treats.

This is the stage where the volunteers just observe the ponies for 20-30 minutes to make sure that they are all OK and eating and show no signs of distress. After several minutes, playing football with the now empty truckles, the penny finally drops and they all start to wander off in search of richer pickings. It's now time to pack the truckles away and repeat the earlier challenges and journey back to the car.

There is undoubtedly a degree of satisfaction in knowing that the ponies are content. Also, not forgetting, I have just subjected myself to some modest exercise and fresh air at the start of the day. More often than not my spirits have been lifted and working largely on my own adds to the experience. I am able to pick my own time of day to visit. I prefer early mornings.

I originally intended to become a lookerer for the 2021 season. However, I enjoyed the visits to the Quantock Turbary and agreed to carry on for a further year but more volunteers are needed for the future.

Lookering is not difficult. It is only required during the summer months and early autumn.

If you think you might be interested, I and I am sure my fellow lookerers would be pleased to show you what is involved. Who knows, you may feel like giving it a try.

MOVING home is certainly a challenge — ranked number two in the most stressful of personal experiences list. Sorting out the 'new' house, getting it just right with painting and decorating and for many much more, even to knocking the lot down — stress may be the wrong

Despite it, there is the laughter or perhaps the pure disbelief side of the move, especially within the Stockland parish, where many of the properties are somewhat old in their build. Indeed, what secrets does the 'new' home hold, what gems have been left

An initial list from the local incomers offers an Indian metal figure of perhaps a horse or cow or sheep — all questioned, a dozen or so of Wills Whiff cigarette cartons, a candelabra (unfortunately not silver), miniature horse shoes which turned out to be not such but those ranging from child to adult footwear.

Perhaps having sorted the interior finds of the property there is then the

garden and its cultivation unless of course fortunately the previous owners were avid horticulturists and basically the need is to sort out the identity of the planting before weed removal.

Once the garden is on the renovation agenda, the guestion of what might be hidden where the new rose bed is to be planted?

One garden find must surely top all others with the owner digging flower beds only to unearth a massif oiled tarpaulin sheet! The mound it covered was large but went unnoticed for some time. This was buried so deep that the mass covering it suggested a sinister outcome. The initial thoughts were: far too large for a body; 'if it's an E-type jag it's mine' and perhaps it is best left alone. These finds still actually belong to the genuine owner. Much bigger a discovery than the truly hoped-for

vehicle though not as potentially valuable — a 1930s muck spreader (plated made in Axminster) in a surprisingly outstanding condition: even the woodwork.

Despite advertising there were notakers though eventually a loving home was found. Caution was shown in any further digging and planting in the said area of the muck spreader burial especially when the fork hit heavy metal with both arm and shoulder vibration strongly felt. The hit was reportedly part of a 1960s Ford Anglia!

New historic discovery on show at church open day

NEWLY-REDISCOVERED historic documents which illustrate the history both of Shute church and Whitford Chapel will be put on display at a Shute church open day in September.

At a tidy-up of St Michael's Church, Shute, in August by a team of volunteers led by Rev Julie Lomas, an old wooden chest was discovered in the vestry.

On inspection, the chest was found to contain the original plans for the 1868 refurbishment of Shute's church, and also the original plans for the Whitford Chapel dating back over 100 years.

The plans are of great historical significance, as well as being very beautiful documents. The 1868 plans for Shute were drawn by the Exeterbased Edward Ashworth, who is widely considered to be the Westcountry's leading church architect.

The plans for Whitford Chapel were drawn by the then vicar of Shute, Rev Stanhope Nourse, who was a talented scholar, artist, and draughtsman. The story of how he campaigned and raised funds for the chapel has been carried in an earlier issue of this magazine, and is also related in the Guide to Shute Church.

The plans will be displayed at an open day at St Michael's Church on Saturday, September 10th, from 10.30am-12.30pm.

The churchwarden, Dr Bijan Omrani, a local historian who has researched the history of the church and parish, will be on hand to offer informal tours and answer any questions about the

church's history.

The organist, Peter Lea Cox, will also be available for some of the time informally to demonstrate the capabilities of the historic 18th Century church organ.

Teas, coffees, and light refreshments will also be available. The open day will raise funds for the Devon Historic Churches Trust as well as the church itself. Please join the event to discover more about the history of this wonderful building.





He joined in many of the village activities, his love of roses and of gardening in general lured him onto the Flower Show committee whilst winning many prizes for his produce. He played skittles, and croquet and gave wise and considered opinions at the Friday Forums. He was a slow but avid reader and retained knowledge which came to be valued at the quizzes! He did enjoy his singing and was one of the founder members of Maggie's Men, later Maggie's Mix.

Maggie Lane read one of the group's favourite pieces taken from psalm 91, On Eagle's Wings, as her tribute, telling how George was always smiling, music sorted and well behaved at choir practices.

Thelma led prayers a collection was taken and John Robinson read the poem, A Life Well Lived, before the congregation followed the family to the churchyard for the burial of ashes.

John makes 'church dash' in before charity marathon

IF you live in and around Yarcombe, Stockland and Dalwood you may have spotted me running the lanes in the early hours wearing my high-vis yellow T-shirts.

I've been running for around threeand-a-half years and, since moving from Twickenham to Yarcombe two years ago, I've had to embrace the challenge of running up and down hills! Since arriving in the Yarty Valley, it has always been an ambition to run to the coast and back; so on Sunday, September 11th I shall be running from Yarcombe to the coast at Branscombe, before returning on a route which will take me past all the churches within the Five Alive Mission Community.

It will be my longest training run ahead of my first London Marathon, which I'm running to raise money for JDRF, a charity set up to find a cure for Type 1 diabetes and researching ways to improve the lives of those living with it.

In 2020, at the height of the first Covid wave, my nephew, James, was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes aged seven. James's dad, my brother-in-law, works overseas on assignment in the Army, and so my sister looks after James and his younger brother on her own most of the time. If you've never seen someone live with diabetes, it's pretty humbling. Weighing out all your food, eating at specific times of the day with no indulgence in between, and pricking your finger/injecting yourself throughout day to manage your insulin levels. It would be hard for any adult to cope with, let alone a seven-year-old



child, and it's really made us appreciate how lucky we are not to have to worry about this.

So, on October 2nd I shall be running the London Marathon for the first time, hoping to raise as much money as possible to support JDRF. Since I started my fundraising, I've realised just how common Type 1 is with lots of friends knowing children living with this condition.

So, to support my fundraising efforts, my longest training run will also be the longest distance I've ever run. On Sunday, September 11th my route first goes up through Yarcombe village before heading down to the coast at Branscombe, then along to Seaton before heading back, with the route passing all the other churches within the Five Alive Mission Community.

Covering 36 miles, I'll be walking the 'ups' and jogging the 'downs', passing St John the Baptist Church, Yarcombe, around 06.15am; St Mary at the Cross, Whitford, 10.40-11.45am; St Michael's Church, Shute, 11am-12.10pm; St Giles's Church, Kilmington, 11.15am-12.30pm; St Peter's Church, Dalwood, 11:40-1pm; and finishing at the Kings Arms in Stockland at some point between 12.20pm and 2pm shortly after my final church at St Michael and All Angels, Stockland.

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ANYTHING BUT A GIFT!

NOW we all love a gift card; the chance to get something we want and not spend our own cash... but did you know that just in the UK, 200 million gift cards are issued each year?

The equivalent weight of of 2400 mid-sized cars — picture that, isn't it appalling! Most of them are single-use plastic which quite often we don't fully realise.

Some things to think about:

• Martin Lewis, money-saving expert, said on one of his programmes, that the real winners in the issue of plastic gift cards are the big retailers because so many recipients forget to use the cards;

- They may not be spent because they are for a retailer which the recipient never frequents
- Plastic gift cards are made from PVC. Greenpeace says that PVC is the most damaging kind of plastic there is, both to the environment and to humans. The PVC is made using chlorine which releases tons of toxins in to the air;
- Beware cards purporting to be made from recyclable plastic; they are highly unlikely to be accepted kerbside so will end up in the environment;
- Gift cards have an expiry date
- What happens to the small


amounts of money left on the card? Add up all the small amounts — who wins? Certainly not the consumer!

So when you are considering buying a gift card for a birthday, a thank-you or for the annual December celebration, could you try to give e-gift 'cards' or those made from paperboard (there are several around)?

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
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
